2018 GRADUATION

HARRY S TRUMAN HIGH SCHOOL held their last graduation ceremony June 7th in the packed Sportsplex in Taylor. This was Truman's 44th and last graduating class. They had the person who received the very first diploma back in 1974 on stage with the person who received the very last Harry S Truman Diploma 44 years later.

John F Kennedy High School also held their ceremony in the Sportsplex. Approximately 200 graduates were led into the ceremony by 20 previous graduates dressed in white caps and gowns. Groups of four representing the previous graduating classes entered in order of decades the 60's then the 70's, 80's 90's and 2000's. The female graduates wore red and the males wore blue. Students were granted permission to decorate the tops of their caps and they looked super.

Back in the sixties , the world was changing rapidly - riots, Woodstock, political unrest, World Series Champions, and student rebellion or was it just the coming of age? John F. Kennedy was elected President and a new sense of vigor and youthful exuberance overtook the country.

Library of Congress Honors Taylor Community Library for Service to Blind Readers

The National Library Service for the Blind and Physically Handicapped (NLS) at the Library of Congress has honored Braille and Talking Books at Taylor Community Library (BTBTCL) in Taylor, Michigan, with the Advisory and Outreach Center of the Year Award for their outstanding service in 2017 to readers who are visually or physically disabled.

"Each year the Library of Congress recognizes the work of state and local libraries that provide braille and talking-book services over the previous year to people who cannot use print materials," said NLS director Karen Keninger. Braille and Talking Books at Taylor Community Library—an advisory and outreach center of the Michigan Braille and Talking Book Library—was created in 2016 to meet the needs of more than 1,000 blind and disabled patrons when the Wayne County Braille and Talking Book Library closed.

Among its achievements in that short time, it has introduced a monthly book discussion, a support group for people with visual impairments and a program that focuses on assistive technology instruction and developments. The library also installed a conference line so people who cannot attend events can participate remotely.

"Serving people, regardless of ability or disability, is our passion," said Vanessa Verdun-Morris, assistant library director at BTBTCL. "Anyone can walk through our doors and be sure staff will take the extra time to help them find materials or solutions that work for them."

The Network Library Awards were created by NLS in 2005. A committee of librarians and consumerorganization representatives select finalists from among nominated libraries based on mission support, creativity, innovation in providing service and demonstrated reader satisfaction. The winner is selected from finalists by the NLS director.

The NLS administers the braille and talking-book program, a free library service available to U.S. residents and American citizens living abroad whose low vision, blindness or disability makes reading regular printed material difficult. Through its national network of libraries, NLS mails books and magazines in talking-book and braille formats and playback equipment directly to enrollees at no cost. Music instructional materials are available in large-print, ebraille, braille, and recorded formats.

In June the Taylor Library presented a 4-step series on employment searching.

WHAT'S HAPPENING IN THE TAYLOR PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Randall Elementry School - Students, faculty and parents of Randall Elementary attended a concert presented by 3rd, 4th and 5th graders. The concert was in support of third grade teacher James Newsome. Newsome developed an infection in January 2018 and went into septic shock. He endured 13 surgeries and lost both of his hands and feet and most of his right leg.

"He is one of the most beloved teachers in Randall," said teacher Donna Calahan. Mr. Newsome was in attendance and it was the first time students had seen him since January. The function raised over \$3,000 to help off set the cost of prostheses.
