GOOD THINGS ARE HAPPENING IN THE TAYLOR PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Dr. Gary Procop's Presentation to Students



Dr. Procop, who is the Medical Director of the Molecular, Microbiology, Mycology, Parasitology & Virology Laboratories at the Cleveland Clinic presented to three

groups of students at Taylor High School, Monday, March 9th. Dr. Procop made an instant contact with the students when he told them about his home life and education. He explained that his father died when Gary was in Junior High School. That left Gary and three other children to struggle financially, along with their mother, who was now the head of a single parent household. Despite not having much money, he was able to graduate from Eastern Michigan University. He stated he missed not having a campus life, but by commuting, working and borrowing from student loans, he was proud he graduated. As a matter of fact, he managed to continue his medical courses and beyond for 15 years. Through a video presentation, he drew parallels between his current work on the coronavirus outbreak with that of the first doctors working on epidemics years ago. After answering questions from the students, he invited them up to view a collection of bed bugs, tics, tape worms, etc. He concluded by thanking the Taylor School System and Staffs for the educational preparation he received prior to his graduation from Kennedy High School in 1983.

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Dr. Procop had to return to the Cleveland Clinic immediately as he was under tremendous pressure dealing with the Corona Outbreak.

Gary told the Taylor Alumni Association and Foundation that he will continue to support the efforts of both of the organizations.

A HISTORY OF PAST AND PRESENT ELEMENTARY SCHOOL BUILDINGS

Our recent articles on present and past school has prompted many responses and corrections from our readers. Here are a couple of examples: John Makar, JFK 1974, gave us this information:

TAYLOR CENTER ELEMENTARY

☑ Building is 1938, originally 1 two story building. A smaller 1 story building with 6 classrooms was added in the late 1950's for K & 1st graders. Auditorium and music room added to original building in early 1960's. The original building was razed.

☑ Roger Swap, TCH 1967, advised us that we had a wrong date of 1960 as the year Eurekadale was built. He was sure it was an continue on next page continue from page 2 (Past & Present School Update)
error as he had attended school there long
before 1960. As a result of Roger's message, I
looked for additional information and found this:

☑ In 1938 Taylor Center was the first school in Wayne County to be fully built by the WPA (Works Progress Administration). This created the 7th School District in Taylor Township. (Note, sounds different but they seemed to have called each school a District.) This indicates that there were six schools built prior to 1938 when Taylor Center (I assume this is Taylor Center Elementary) was built.

The article goes on to say that in 1946 the seven School Districts voted to be consolidated into one District. The seven were:

- ★ Edison We had it being built in 1938 seems it may have been built earlier.
- ★ Edgewood We had information that it was built in 1928, which appears to make it the oldest.
- ★ Eurekadale We were partly in error...It appears it was built in 1938 or earlier and then a new building was built in 1960. There were actually two pictures according to the historical society photographs.
- * Fletcher Again, we had 1938 and it could have been earlier.

Your Taylor Alumni Association thanks John for the information and Roger for pointing out the error. I found the research very interesting and will continue to attempt to find more information. I asked Caroline Patts to contact the Taylor Historical Society for more information. We'll follow up with any additional information we find in a future issue.

I am not an expert, but I sure was impressed. And what a gift to give his sisters. What do you think of the poem? Please send comments to johnpantalone@sbcglobal.net


