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

School Foundation


is providing funds

WHERE ARE THEY NOW... FEATURING THE JFK AND TCH CLASSES OF 1967 (50 YEAR AGO).

Tom Fraser, JFK 1967

After graduation, Tom learned the 'hard way' about the meaning of 'really hard work" as he scaled the ladder from landscaping, to installations of underground piping systems, to Hydra-Matic to beginning his Pipefitting Apprenticeship. Along the way he acquiring an Associate Degree from Washtenaw Community College. In 1982 Tom was selected to be part of GM's pipefitting team and was sent to Ramos Arizpe in Northern Mexico. Tom than became Senior Lead on the pipefitting team and was sent back to Ramos then on to Silao Mexico and onto San Luis Potosi. From 1999 to 2008 he was on three international tours and two off-shore assignments. In 2008 Tom and his wife Pam had to make a decision. GM offered him a 3 year tour to Brazil. They both decided it was time

for retirement. Pam said, "Thank goodness we chose jointly to come home because almost two years to the day that Tom was "officially retired" both of our lives changed in an instant.



On November 22, 2010 Tom went to the Holly National Military Cemetery to pay respects to friend Tim Straub at his funeral service. After the service Tom spoke with Tim's family and friends including Mr. Pantalone. Tom started for home but within a few minutes an AVM hemmorage (at the center of the brain) started to main. He pulled off the road and was found slumped over his steering wheel and rushed to a hospital in Holly. Pam was

of a 100. Those who do survive are generally confined to bed, breathing tubes and wheelchairs. Pam says "The healing process was grueling, painful and without mercy at some times. How he was able to endure all that he went through those $2\frac{1}{2}$ months in ICU, goes beyond the pale of understanding".

Today, Tom Fraser is a new man. He has learned to communicate in non-traditional, but very clever ways. He is back on his tractor mower and manicures the lawn. He shovels snow and goes to the gym 3 times per week.

Pam (Durfee TCH 67) Fraser said to me "Mr. Pantalone, life is good. I don't think either of us would change one thing in exchange for all the love. Peace and Joy our life together has brought us through all these 46 years".

My Senior year at TCH is very memorable as I met my "True Love", Jim Barringer. Jim and I had a Co-op position in the Board Office which was in the same building as our high school. I worked in the payroll department. That position was a great experience as the entire office force was helpful and friendly. Jim and I were married in 1968, the same year I was hired to be a secretary in the Taylor Schools. I worked as a Secretary for $37\frac{1}{2}$ years. Jim started working at Fords in 1968. After only 10 months Jim received his draft notice to report to South Carolina for Basic Training. Due to having the summer off as a school secretary, I was able to go to South Carolina to be near Jim. He soon left for Vietnam. I was a total mess worrying about his safety. During his

duty in Vietnam he was given a Rest and Relaxation leave and he chose to go to Hawaii where I met him and spent a great two weeks. Jim was discharged in 1970 and went back to Fords and worked for 30 years until his retirement.



Back to 1970 after Jim's

Service time...we purchased a
home in Taylor and raised two
daughters. We felt fortunate
that they had an opportunity
to attend TCH before it was
closed. Both daughters,
Carrie (1990 TCH) and Laurie
(1993 TCH), feel they had a
great education in the Taylor
Schools. Both went on to
college and have Master's
degrees, Carrie in Social
Work and Laurie in Nursing.

Jim and I have not missed a class reunion and are looking

forward to our 50th Reunion in 2017. We have had a great life and contribute much of that to the education we and are children received in the Taylor Schools.
