loved my time at Kennedy. Many of my school time when there were few women agents it friends are still friends today.

My favorite classes were art, but I also had a lot of great teachers whose influence has stayed with me all my life. I am so thankful the arts were an important part of the curriculum in the Taylor schools. They gave me a lifelong love of painting and drawing. Art is something that never leaves you and brings you pleasure all your life. "When I say artist, I mean the one who is building things...some with a brush, some with a shovel, some with a musical instrument, some choose a pen." -Jackson Pollock

It was my interest in art that led me to my career in law enforcement. Well, that, and having a Dad who was a detective for the Taylor Police Department. When I was a sophomore, Dad asked me to do a police drawing. That sketch helped catch a killer and I was hooked.

I taught school for 3 years before becoming one of the first female Special Agents recruited through the Detroit office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). I was lucky to be in the right place at the right time.

My painting got sidelined when I became an agent in 1978 but being able to do composite drawings was a handy skill on the bank robbery/fugitive squad in Chicago. At a time when there were few women agents it helped me get accepted much faster. When I transferred to Washington, D.C., I was assigned to work counterintelligence (CI) and later counterespionage (CE). Much to my surprise, I did composite drawings there too. I worked with one Russian defector who kept asking me to put more lines around the eyes of the drawings we were doing. He was initially a bit standoffish, so the next day when he asked me to add more wrinkles I joked, "Your people must be really hard on your intelligence officers." It broke the ice and from then on he would point to the eyes and say, "He needs more KGB wrinkles."



I retired after 25 years as a Special Agent, which included time as a CE supervisor. A few months after I retired, I was asked to return as a contractor and mentor new CE Supervisors and personnel at FBI Headquarters in Washington D.C. In an interesting twist in life, I went full circle and transferred from FBI Headquarters to the FBI Academy as an instructor in the CI Center and teaching again. continue on page 5


JOHN F KENNEDY CLASS 1978 40TH REUNION, AUGUST 18TH & 19TH

I worked in an interesting world cloaked in secrecy. There were cases I couldn't even discuss with my husband, who was also an FBI Agent. Even more exciting was being sent all over the world to places I never dreamed I'd ever get a chance to see. I worked on many high-profile espionage cases including that of Navy civilian Jonathan Pollard who spied for Israel, and Brian Regan (retired U.S. Air Force) who attempted to spy for a number of countries. I was the case agent on the former and the Supervisor on the latter. In 2015, Pollard was released after 30 years in prison and Regan is serving a life sentence.


