Gordon Krater

JFK, 1976 Graduate Gordon Krater is one of the recipients of The University of Michigan Ross School of Business Honorary Paton Fellow Award. He was recognized during a special induction ceremony on March 21, 2019.

To enhance the Paton Fellow Program's mission of encouraging Michigan undergraduate students to explore a career in accounting, the Paton Center created the Honorary Paton Fellow Award to honor individuals who through their accounting expertise have made significant contributions as business leaders.

Krater received his BBA from U of M in 1980, and is a former managing partner and CPA at Plante Moran. He joined the company after graduation to follow in his father's (another U of M graduate) footsteps into public accounting. During his 38-year career with Plante Moran, Krater held a variety of positions before rising to firm overall managing partner, where he guided the client service, growth, talent development, risk management, and strategic direction of the firm. Charles E. Brake Junior High School Taylor, Michigan

Charles E Brake was superintendent of Wayne County Schools in the 1950's when the Jr. High was being built. He was a recipient of the Fulbright Scholarship for his work in establishing school systems in Europe. Brake was a renowned educator who specialized in rural education. He graduated from the University of Michigan in 1930, and passed away in October of 1972.

In the April Alumni Newsletter it was stated that the TCH Class of 1969 was the first class to have spent 4 years in the Taylor Center High building. That was wrong! The 57' and 58' classes also spent 4 years in the TCH building. We now know that many people are reading the newsletters as we received many emails and phone calls pointing out the error. One phone call was received from Karen Clement Shonta, Class of 1957 from TCH. She was asked to let us know what has transpired since 1957. The following is what was received.

After graduating from Taylor Center High School in 1957, I was employed by the Taylor School District as a school secretary. I first worked at Fairlane Elementary. From there I was transferred to the board of education office. I missed the contact with teachers and children, so I applied to be transferred to Brake Junior High School. While working there, I met my future husband. We were married the following year.

He taught school for one year in Northville (Northville is located in and divided by Oakland and Wayne counties). That was just before the American Football League was being formed. He contacted the coach and asked if he could try out for the team and was told he would be able to and the

rest is history. Chuck went through the training camp and had the great fortune to be chosen for the team. He played for the Boston Patriots which is now the New England Patriots for



eight years. He started out in the AFL and ended up in the NFL. And yes, a concussion ended his career. Living in Boston during the season was fabulous. It is a great place to live. Lots of wonderful restaurants and history.

Fortunately, he had his teaching degree and taught for 33 years in Northville.

We have two daughters. One followed in her father's footsteps and became a teacher teaching in Northville. Our other daughter is an editor and free lances at home. We have four grandchildren, 2 girls and 2 boys. We lived in Romulus for 42 years and now live in New Boston. Most of our summer is spent in Port Hope (thumb area) at our place on Lake Huron.

Several years ago, we went on a cruise around the Hawaiian Islands. Our high school counselor, Mrs. Pauloski, just happened to live on the big island of Hawaii. I had always been in touch with her because we shared the same birthday. I wrote to her and told her our ship would be stopping in Hilo. She and her husband, John, met our ship. They took us all over the island to see all the fabulous sights. That evening Mrs. Pauloski came on board the ship and had dinner with us. We had such a wonderful day with them.

There is a small group of us graduates who meet for dinner once a month. Most of us are from the 1957 and a few from 1958 classes.
