60 YEARS AGO

Taylor Center High School 1959 — The 12th graders, you might recall, were the first graduating class to have spent all 4 years in that building. The first 3 years you attended school from 7:30 am to 12:30 pm and 7th & 8th graders took over the building in the afternoon.

The class enjoyed many fun activities. Carol Gazel remembered Susan Phail being crowned homecoming queen, the "Fun Night" carnival complete with a cotton candy machine and graduation which was scheduled for the football field but it rained and we had to cram all the graduates and parents into a very hot gym.

The 58-59 Basketball season was a success for the Taylor Rams who had a record of 12 wins and 3 losses. The Rams also won the district tournament defeating Monroe 50 to 48. They also won the first game of the regionals defeating Dearborn 58-57.

50 YEARS AGO

Taylor Center Class of 1969 — There were 465 Graduates from TCH and they had several Faculty members that had graduated from Taylor Center High School. Just to mention a few: Harold Dozier, Tom Kurginski, Mickey Turcheck, Bill Iverson and Ken Avery.

The Marching Band performed at the Detroit Lion - Minnesota football game in Tiger Stadium before a national TV audience.

Civic classes came to life for upperclassmen on a three day trip to Washington D.C.

Co-captains Debby Karabees and Rosemary Mills led their Cheerleading team to two consecutive Mid-Wayne Conference team Championships. In another

John F Kennedy Class of 1969 — 521 students graduated in 1969 making it the largest Graduating class in Taylor history.

The Eagle football squad, led by Rex Baugh, Keith Baxter, Jim Chapman, Stu Kerr, and Mike O'Malley, had a record of 7 wins and 2 losses. One of the wins was a 20-13 victory over crosstown rival Taylor Center.

A strong athletic year continued with a Basketball team record of 12 wins and four losses, followed by the gymnastics squad placing 3rd in the State tournament led by Dan Witz, who was awarded All State Honors.

Vice President Hubert Humphrey was in the area trumping up support for his run for President. Included in his entourage was Olympian Rafer Johnson. They stopped at JFK and watched Roger Craig's marching band practice. After watching the practice, Mr. Humphrey stated he would have the JFK Band march in his inauguration parade if he were elected. A fine compliment but, as we know, he did not win the Presidency.

WHAT'S IN THE NAME?

The following is taken from an article in the "Open House" booklet, dated May 19, 1957: Clarence Randall and family moved to Taylor in 1930. At that time Taylor Township only



had elementary schools and all three of Mr. Randall's sons attended those schools. There was not a senior high school, so the boys went to Dearborn.

Mr. Randall was elected to the Board of Education in 1937 and served on that board for over 50 years. Although Clarence Randall had dedicated his life to his wife, Ester, and sons, Walter, Donald and Clarence Jr., he took time to work for better education in Taylor Township and no day was too long for Clarence if it was spent working for the boys and girls of this area....
