# **HISTORY OF: Our Library**



Since the Roaring '20s, the community has had services of one type or another.

Since 1922, Taylor has been serving the community with library services. In the early days, access to books was provided by the Wayne County Bookmobile, which would visit on a regular basis to lend books to the residents. In 1929, the Taylor Center branch of the Wayne County Library opened. More than 20 years later, the Taylor

Center branch had outgrown the small building in which it was housed and needed to expand. So, in 1953, the library moved to a larger building.

Once again, the community outgrew the library space, so the need for books and information was met with the opening of Library 1 on Goddard Road followed by Library 2 at Wick and Mortenview in 1968. In later years, the libraries were renamed to Alexander Papp Library and Richard J. Trolley Library to honor the Taylor leaders who were instrumental in their construction.

By 1983, it was evident that the community would be better served by combining the two smaller libraries into one large library. Plans were drafted to meet that need and, in 1985, the new Taylor Community Library was completed. Since that time, the library staff has continually improved the services it provides to the community and the facility remains one of the leaders in delivering information access in the Downriver community.

My name is Mike Hargraves and a proud member of the Taylor Center class of 1971. Coming from 9 years of Catholic school I did not know what to expect from public schools. I was not disappointed. My good friend encouraged me to join the band and the rest was a great 3-year experience. Back in those days it really didn't matter what circle you were in, Grease, Jock, Brain, or Band it seemed looking back everyone got along. I think my proudest moment in my 3 years there was the opportunity to represent my city, my school, my classmates in performing with the band at Detroit Lions games carried on national television, countless band days at the major Michigan universities, marching in parades all across Michigan, but what stood out was Friday night football games. Especially home games when we got the

opportunity to meet and get into formation about 615 just outside the band room and March loudly and proudly around the horseshoe in front of the school, all 120 of us, and end up at the north end of the field awaiting our cue to March our pregame show concluding with the song of our nation, the national anthem. We did get to do some away games also which turned into a competition with the home team, but I think I remember we always prevailed.

After the home games we would once again form in ranks and proudly and loudly march back to the band room reversing our entry almost 3 hours prior. It never got old marching the horseshoe as it was unique to our school, and I felt so privileged to wear that interlocking TC on my gold satin cape. Just a note, I think I remember that if we won, that meaning the football team, tradition would have us turn our hats backwards and unlatch the clasp on the back of the cape so our gold would prevail as the embroidered TC showed proudly to all. I picked back up with many classmates building eternal friendships at our 40th and 50th reunions. Through the years' time does not separate the bond that high school classes or the memories, just makes them all better when we meet again.

After high school I went to school and did brief encounters of work for a few years each at a sporting goods store in Taylor and Pan American Airlines before settling into my profession of working almost 40 years for a legal service.

Additionally, I devoted countless hours serving youth and city organizations both in coaching and administrative positions in football, baseball, softball, and hockey along with a long term with a city commission.

I also had the distinct honor to serve Truman H.S. as the president of the football booster club for many years and became the administrator and manager of the high school hockey program that included saving Kennedy by merging the 2 schools together to represent Taylor as a unified hockey program. My interest in hockey is extensive and has led me to serving in the professional level as I entered my 45th season of working professional hockey games. 6 seasons with the Detroit Red Wings and the past 39 with the National Hockey League in a Supervisory position of off ice officials.

My other passion outside of sports is my love of Disney and what it stands for trying to bring families together and escape the craziness of the world we live in. I have been lucky to have visited over 50 times.

I was married for 20 years and received 2 beautiful children who are now very successful in their own right and was blessed with my first grandchild "Little Lucy" in August of this year.

A mural commissioned to honor Taylor's 175th anniversary has arrived in the city. The mural is scheduled to be placed inside Taylor City Hall on a wall near the Goddard Road entrance.

anniversary celebration, held on August 6, 2022, at Heritage Park. Taylor was founded as a township on March 16, 1847. Taylor Township incorporated as the City of Taylor in 1968. The year 2022 is the 175th anniversary of the founding of Taylor. Taylor Mayor Tim Woolley said. "I think it turned out great and it will be adorning City Hall in the next couple of weeks."
