I graduated from Taylor Center in 1995. I was a football player and threw shot and discus on the track team. I continued playing football at Adrian College and was a member of the 1997 MIAA Championship team. I graduated from Adrian with a BA in English.

While I was at Adrian, one of my professors spoke with me about her experiences teaching abroad in Japan on the JET Program. She inspired me to apply, and soon I was on my first flight to Japan. I taught English Conversation to high school students in Yokkaichi City, Mie Prefecture. The city was just south of Nagoya. I lived by myself for two years. While I had no command of the language when I went,



I became fairly fluent in Japanese. It was an amazing experience.

When I returned to the U.S., I ended up teaching in my minor. I taught Spanish for about 16 years in various districts, with the most recent being Garden City. I was also the Head Boys Track Coach and an Assistant Football Coach for Garden City.

WHERE ARE THEY NOW? TIM RODGERS, JFK (1976)

y name is Tim Rodgers and I am a 1976 graduate of Taylor Kennedy High School. I am composing this letter to talk about my great experience in

school and how the teachers and administrators at Kennedy changed my life. Even though this letter is intended to talk about my high school years, I would be remiss if I didn't mention one Brake Junior High teacher, David McGhee. Mr. McGhee was my English and Social Studies teacher and had such a strong influence on me that I began thinking that teaching was what I wanted to do with my life. His natural positive feelings toward all students was always evident and reflected in the great overall atmosphere of his class. He was also my 7th grade basketball coach, which was my first organized sport. David became a lifelong mentor and helped me many times in my life. I am proud to say he is a friend to this day.

My first interaction with anyone from Kennedy High School was my counselor, Reginald Dickson. Many families have internal struggles that did not always show from the outside, ours was no exception. Mr. Dickson was a pillar of strength to lean on for all three years of high school, and believe me it was much needed. I really don't know how I might have turned out if he was not there for the continuous support that he so easily and caringly provided.

The principal at Kennedy, Mr. Maley, was a powerful leader and tremendously respected by all. Here I am now at 60 years old and I have not experienced a better front person. He had great wing men to support him in Mr. Pantalone (JP to you and I) and Mr. Trierweiler. It was truly special to have them around and involved in the entire educational process. I swear JP slept at the school. He was literally at every sport and extracurricular activity we had. He also helped develop a learning environment in the building that was contagious to success. Later in the academic life he became a teaching mentor to my wife Jessica. JP is yet another Taylor educator that I remain friends with at this time.

Our school was blessed with many teachers that were not only outstanding at what they did, but simply ahead of their time. In math Mr. Rocket found a way to make things fun. More importantly we did things with punch cards and Fortran which were precursors to early computer work that other districts did not know existed. Mr. McLean made Psychology so interesting, entertaining and intriguing that it became one of my minors in college. Mr. Raebel taught many levels of Micro Biology and

made a difficult subject seem second nature to me. Mr. Freeman, also a great science teacher, coached cross country and track. His methods and coaching techniques were so advanced that I didn't experience anything like it until my later years of college. Regretfully he retired from coaching after my sophomore year. Speaking of coaches, the building was loaded with other legends: Bob Sclater, Van Kostegian and Forest Bone to name a few. I played three years of Varsity Basketball for Coach Kostegian; not only was he a powerful influence, he played an important part in my career. I will talk about that a little later.

We also had many elective classes that were not only enjoyable but really helped in multiple ways. One of these classes was Advanced Effective Reading taught by Ms. Proctor. This class was a speed-reading class that not only taught me how to read faster but much more proficiently, thus a natural creator of better study habits.

Charlie Dickelman, Big D, the original Michigan Man. Charlie not only deserves his own paragraph, he deserves his own book. The amount of people he influenced in life is immeasurable. He was a naturally gifted teacher. Everyone loved him. If I thought I wanted to be a teacher earlier in my academic life, Charlie sealed the deal. I was going to be a teacher and had hopes of being a fraction as good as he was. He was a father figure to me, a hilarious one, but one just the same. We became extremely close friends that lasted a life time. I miss him every day.

Charlie helped me land a job at the Athlete's Foot in the Southland Mall - there he was influencing me once again. What a great gig, a jock being around sneakers all the time. Earlier I mentioned that Coach Kostegian had an influence on my career. Playing for him instilled a work ethic and discipline in me that I believe has lasted a life time. He asked me one day, "Rodgers what do you want to be in life?" I replied, "Coach, since I was 13 all I ever wanted to do was teach and coach." He laughed and said, "Son, you would be pretty good at it." Then he gave me some good advice, he mentioned that we should all have a backup plan in life especially for a career. He strongly suggested mine should be in sales because he felt I was made for it.



I went on to Central Michigan University, with a few detours here and there, and earned my degree in Education. I student taught in Saginaw where I met my beautiful future wife Jessica who is a teacher at Novi High School. Due to the lack of teaching jobs at the time, I never taught after that. The job that Big D helped me get at the Athlete's Foot became part of the backup plan Coach Kosi suggested. I parlayed that experience into my first job with Nike. I worked for them on two occasions in my career as well as Fila and Ralph Lauren to name a couple. I am currently the Senior Key Account Manager for New Era Cap, which are the caps you see on all Major League Baseball players as well as on the NFL sidelines. I am in charge of New

Era sales for Dick's Sporting Goods and Kohl's nationally. We ship about one million caps a week worldwide.

I was also fortunate enough to coach varsity basketball with Mike Lever at Taylor Center High School and then later for many memorable years with Chuck Suttles at Taylor Center and then Truman. My teaching degree did come to good use during all of those years of coaching. I hope I had half the positive influence on some of those players as all of the outstanding teachers, administrators and coaches had on me during high school. Who I am today is a direct reflection of those who were a part of my life at Taylor Kennedy High School. *K*
