The City of Taylor Butch Ramik resigns from City Council *From the City of Taylor's website*

One of the City Council's most noticeable faces, Herman "Butch" Ramik, has resigned. Ramik submitted his resignation to City Council Chairman Doug Geiss on December 13 and made the public announcement during the regular meeting on December 19. "I won't forget where I came from," he said during the council meeting. "It's an honor to serve the public – there's nothing like it." ...continued from page 1...by Raymond Basham to take over Basham's Wayne County commissioner's post, pending approval by the commission as a whole in early January Basham recently retired and county commissioners often nominate residents from their home districts to fill out their terms. This Taylor City Council term was the fourth time Ramik was elected to the seven-member body.

Ramik served in the military during the Vietnam War. He was with the 23rd Infantry Division out of Chu Lai. He returned home a highly decorated soldier after being awarded the Purple Heart, Bronze Star, Combat Infantryman's Badge, and other military citations. He went on to become an Army drill sergeant at Fort Leonardwood, Missouri serving the military, he served on the Taylor Police Department for 20 years, where he also earned a Purple Heart, Medal of Valor, and Mayor's Medal. Overall, he served in law enforcement for 35 years.

Ramik was a security officer at West Middle School until his resignation.

POLICE PURCHASE STARCHASE SYSTEM

Stopping high speed chases before they begin

New system enables police to 'tag' vehicles and track them down, using GPS



High-speed police pursuits are a constant public safety challenge for law enforcement officials. Taylor Police may have an alternative by using modern technology. Instead of chasing a car, they will literally harpoon it with a "tag" and track the vehicle until they can make an arrest.

This is yet another part of the department's constant efforts to step outside of the typical law enforcement toolbox to improve

practices and keep the community safe. "This is new technology that can eliminate some high-speed chases," Police Chief John Blair said. "It's like firing a dart at a vehicle. You 'tag it,' track it via GPS and eventually apprehend the suspect. "It goes without saying that high-speed chases are dangerous for the police officer, the suspect, and the public. If we can cut down or eliminate the need for these chases, it is a good thing for everyone involved."

The technology is proving to be a valuable tool towards increased community safety. StarChase is just the newest tool in the Taylor Police toolbox of modern crime fighting technologies. Within the past several years, the department has entered into an agreement with Axon Network, which provides everything from Tasers to body and vehicle cameras, along with supporting technology. Meanwhile, Flock Safety has offered license plate recognition camera technology, as well as cameras in the City's parks. In addition, the city has invested in new vehicles and recently renovated the police station on the City Hall campus. ...continued on page 3...

...continued from page 2... "All of this helps our police do their jobs better and makes our community safer," Mayor Tim Woolley said. "But it also helps us recruit new police officers to Taylor, which is extremely important in this era. We've had many young police officers join our force, along with many transfers. One of the first things they mention is all the new technology."

News from the Taylor Schools

Update:

Kennedy High School is almost completely down. No updates on bricks yet. The Alumni Association will let you know when they are ready for sale and distribution.

The board of education building that is on Northline Road has been vacated and abated. All the departments have moved to the former Brake/6th Grade Academy on Pine Street and Superior. This is also the building that houses our Taylor Alumni Museum. (More information on the museum soon) The old board office building will be demolished to make way for the new high school.

District's New Utilization Plan

In December 2023, the district unveiled its plan to reimagine how it utilizes its elementary schools and how it operates at the middle school level. Here is what was presented at the December 20, 2023, board meeting. This plan will be voted on by the Taylor School Board on January 8, 2023. With capacity in most buildings under 75%, the state funding would be compromised. Capacity according to the state should be at 80%+., therefore, buildings will be combined. It was mentioned before that the two middle schools would be combined and go to the former Truman , now Taylor High school. Combined together both middle schools wouldn't have 80%+ in that building.

School Year 2024-25

1. Eureka Heights elementary will go to Holland elementary and McDowell elementary

2. Kinyon elementary will go to the Johnson building.

3. Johnson preschool will go to Eureka Heights building

4. Kinyon building will be vacant to work on for the following year as a 6th grade academy.

5. The utility department will move from the Pine Street building to the north side of Career Center on Westlake (old TC Jr.)

6. The Pine Street building will be demolished.

School Year 2025-26

1. West Middle school will become 7th & 8th grade middle school and be renamed Taylor Middle School

2. Kinyon building will become the 6th grade academy.

3. Randall elementary will move to the Hoover building. The building will be renamed Randall elementary, Randall building on Pardee will be demolished.

4. Taylor Parks elementary will split between Moody elementary and the new Randall elementary. Taylor Parks building will be demolished.
