KEEPING UP WITH GRADS!

n 1985 a committee composed of students, alumni,

city leaders, church representatives, and school administrators established rules and procedures for selecting distinguished alumni from the graduates of the Taylor public schools. The very first selection was Dr. Tom Gonda, a 1972 graduate of Kennedy High School. He was active in high school, having been a member of the debateforensics team, placing first in all of their league meets. He also was a member of the state championship gymnastics team and claimed a personal state championship of the side horse competition. Part one of the Tom Gonda story was in the October Newsletter. LIFE AFTER JFK

Tom writes—I chose to attend Harvard University and enrolled in pre-med. I buried myself in my classes, biology, biochemistry, advanced math and organic chemistry. It was brutal. I was lucky enough to be in a "final club", it is like a fraternity, but you do not live there. I met 8 guys from all over the country. We had a great time and were supportive of each other. This was a considerable help and I eventually graduated from Harvard with honors.

ON TO MEDICAL SCHOOL

I chose to go to Stanford University, renowned for the continue on page 2

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school of medicine. My focus was taking me in the direction of cardiothoracic surgery. This was very challenging for me, perhaps another test of resilience and distress tolerance.

Now I had to get board certified in general surgery. My training was at Lenox Hill Hospital in Manhattan. A brutally competitive program that required about 100 hours per week. When that was completed, I added residency training in thoracic surgery for two years.

Finally, I was able to set up shop as a self-employed surgeon in the bay area of California. I Was busy from day one and, over a 25 year span, participated in approximately 20,000 surgeries. I self-evaluated and decided it was time to retire from a career that knew no hours, being on call 24 hours per day. I felt I could no longer maintain the work pace of a thoracic surgeon. I still had the urge to help people in some capacity. Albert Einstein once said, "Only a life lived in the service of others is worth living". So, off to school again for psychotherapy for marriage and family therapy. I now live in San Diego and have a very busy private practice in psychiatry. I have office locations in San Francisco, Oakland, San Diego, Reno, and Las Vegas, which I service every month.

Looking back at my experiences at JFK, I learned that being coached and inspired by the best instills a hope for the future and promise of a better life. Obstacles are mere steppingstones. I will meet those challenges as my JFK teachers told me to do. I do believe, at the age now of 66, that anything is possible even for a guy with average abilities. I say to JFK teachers, staff, coaches and fellow classmates, "Thank you".

Taylor Schools attempt to navigate a literal minefield in 1983

Heading back to school in the fall of 1983, students and their parents in the Taylor School District faced the possibility of a radical shakeup, the threats of which had not been heard of here before. The school district had major problems for over a decade and had fallen into receivership in the late 1970s. Strikes, picket lines and parent sit-ins were not uncommon. For a brief period, there had even been three superintendents simutaneously on the district's payroll. The newest Superintendent - Jerry Montecillo - was charged with cleaning up the district under orders by State Superintendent Phillip Runkel.

Major cuts would take effect if a ballot referendum was not passed the following February. The ballot requested a 5.4 million increase as well as approval of a \$5.7 million deficit elimination bond. These proposed cuts were perhaps the most radical ever announced in the face of possible failure.

In the proposal - named the continue on next page

"Pack And Save Plan," - half of the elementary schools (9 of 18) would close and students from the three high schools (Taylor Center, Kennedy and Truman) would all be brought together in two groups using one 5-hour shift at one high school. Bus service would also be eliminated. If the proposal was to fail, students would be directed to bring paper bags to their school the next day to pack up their books "for their new education." In other words, failure of the bond would result in immediate consequences.

Fortunately, both the millage and bond passed easily in February 1984. A total of 17,690 residents came to vote, a number 2½ times the amount of any prior failed millage.

In school year 1983-84, part of my duties as Assistant Principal was to schedule teachers in JFK. When the "Pack and Save" concept was being developed I was asked to create a schedule for the students and faculty of all three high school and have it ready intimate for the consolidation of the three schools into the one building in the event the millage failed. It was not an idle threat. If the millage had failed the "Pack and Save" would have taken place 2nd semester. -Written by John Pantalone
