DOWN MEMORY LANE: THE 70'S

SCHOOLS

McDowell, Myers, Career Center and Truman Junior and Senior High Schools were built.

In the mid 70's enrollment hit a peak of over 20,000 students, compared to this fall's enrollment of under 6,000 enrollees K thru 12.

Alumni data shows 1975 graduates from the 3 high schools totaled 1350. June 2019 there were only 316 graduates. The single highest graduating class in the 70's was 1973 JFK with 651 Grads. 1972 TCH graduated 552 their largest for the 70's. HST graduated 564 in 1979 which was their largest class ever. The largest graduating class in the District was TCH 1965 with 745 Grads.

CITY

Population in 1970 was 70,020 and increased to 77,568 by 1980. Current population is approximately 61,500.

Southland Mall opened in 1970 and consisted of three anchor

stores: Hudson's at mall center, Woolworth's Dime Store, off the center court, and a Kroger supermarket on the eastern side. A two-screen movie theater was opened within weeks of the mall opening.

Detroit was the 5th largest city in the USA.

KEEPING UP WITH GRADS!

Dr. Tom Gonda | JFK 1972

Tom, a 1972 Graduate of JFK, was named a Distinguished Alumnus in 1982. I recall some details from the nomination application. By that date Tom had graduated from Harvard with honors; then from Stanford with a medical degree, specializing in heart surgery. Established as a heart surgeon, he also performed as a member of a Rock Band and competed in Triathlons. Dr. Thomas was a unanimous choice and returned to JFK to give the commencement address.

Since we are featuring the 70's in this edition, now seems a good time for an update of Dr. Gonda's career. He was gracious enough to send the following:

After graduating in 1972, I was headed to the finest Ivy League school in the country. Many changes had happened to me at JFK just in the last month of school that made me the man I am today. In the audience on graduation day was my family, but minus one key person—my father.

On May 31, 1972, my father, Thomas Andrew Gonda Sr., was murdered in a failed robbery attempt at his furniture store on Grand River Ave. in Detroit, Michigan. Three thugs

brandishing weapons threatened to shoot everyone. My mother and father's sister were there working. My father grabbed a shotgun to protect his family, but, before he could fire, he took several bullets and died at the scene. The killers were apprehended, but I never did find out what happened to them. If any reader can enlighten me on that point, I would like to know. My father's death was devastating to all our family members and those in the community. I was going to graduate from JFK in a few weeks, it was a success that my father would never see. Many nights I cried myself to sleep. I was determined to honor my father's hard work ethic and continue to run the furniture store at age 17, but I was grieving and confused. I couldn't decide for many weeks whether to continue the business or go to college. I was running the business successfully and potentially could have continued, but, despite having no source of money, I decided to go away to college. I left for Harvard in August 1972 with a full financial scholarship.



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As a child. I wanted to be either a cardiac surgeon or a psychiatrist. I was enamored with the idea of curing disease by operating on the heart and also helping people by talking to them. I was fascinated when Mr. Robert Smith, my 6th grade teacher, described the Freudian concepts of id, ego and superego. While enrolled at JFK, I was drawn to two things: Debate, Forensics and Gymnastics. Fortunately, for me, JFK had the best coaches in the statemaybe the country—for Gymnastics. Our coach, Roger Bechtol, is a man who brought us to our full potential. He coaxed us in a most gentle and caring way. Because of him, our team won the State Championships every year that I was there. I never liked the term "jock" but I came to be comfortable with the term after I won an All State High School Individual Championship in 1972. I still remember the great gymnasts: Mike O'Malley, Steve Rimar, Randy Mills, Elliott Everson, Steve Wiggins, Timothy Witz, Frank Siemienski, Eddie Ewald, Duane Nimitz and many more I could mention. I would observe them in awe in practice and at competitions. I couldn't believe the strength, balance, nerve and courage of the JFK warriors in white tights. In retrospect, this was a group of really great guys-workers, untiring effort, devotion, intensity and strength. There was no drama, chaos or conflict but rather an atmosphere of humbleness and



quiet appreciation for the chance of athletic competition. I think of an ideal sports team as having these qualities.

Debate and Forensics: The success of the JFK debate and forensics team was equal to the amazing accomplishments of the gymnastics team. Our hero and coach was Robert Clements. A very devoted, intense, supportive, challenging man who orchestrated many individuals and teams into performing their best. We won tournament after tournament and honor after honor. I remember and think fondly of the great debaters: Denise Gorsline, Marsha Solem, Mark Taylor, and so many others. The experience inspired me to continue debate in college on the Harvard debate team. Now in life, I am very comfortable giving expert witness testimony in courtroom and legal depositions for my patients.

Another Graduate Success Story



HARRY S TRUMAN GRADS ARE SUCCESSFUL ENTREPRENEURS

Krissy and Jason McGuire are owners of Humbug Marina in Gibraltar. She stands in front of the newly constructed platform that will become a patio for a waterfront restaurant the couple is building. Both Krissy Noble McGuire, 1997, and Jason McGuire, 1992, are graduates of Harry S Truman High School. The fact that Jason and Krissy McGuire want to build a waterfront restaurant is no secret. In fact, they made it known when they purchased the Humbug Marina in Gibraltar that a restaurant and bar figured prominently in their plans. Now those plans are turning into a reality. When the McGuires purchased the property two years ago, they quickly made some changes, but the biggest is yet to come. A large platform was constructed just a couple

of weeks ago which will serve as the restaurant's patio. Krissy said she is uncomfortable giving timelines since they are subject to change due to circumstances beyond their control. She said a tentative opening for the restaurant is early October.

The McGuires reside in Gibraltar, but both are originally from Taylor, where they have owned JP McGuire's Bar & Grill for almost 10 years. When they purchased the marina in 2017 they had no experience with marinas, but when they purchased "JP McGuires" in Taylor they did not have any experience with restaurants either. In the volatile restaurant and bar business, lack of experience can hurt some owners, but the McGuires say that has not been the case with them. JP McGuire's Bar & Grill is a popular place to dine and enjoy a beverage in Taylor, and they are confident they can do the same thing in Gibraltar.

Jay unfurled the project's blueprints to reveal the layout of the restaurant, which will have a seating capacity of up to 300 people, including the patio. One thing that will make this restaurant unique is that it will have approximately 45 transient slips for boaters who wish to stop in for a drink or bite to eat.

The McGuires say a couple of restaurants in the area offer a few boat slips for diners, but not nearly as many as they are planning. Krissy said they plan to mimic what they're doing in Taylor, in terms of the menu, although the Gibraltar restaurant will have a nautical theme and will serve steak and seafood on a daily basis. "There will be no price gouging," Jay said. "People will be able to afford to eat here."

Many Gibraltar residents know that the food that will be served will be similar to the offerings at JP McGuire's in Taylor. They say if you like the food at the Taylor location you will like the food at the Gibraltar location. The McGuires say many of those residents have visited the Taylor location to check it out. Krissy said the plan is to train new employees at their restaurant in Taylor so they'll be ready to go when the Gibraltar restaurant opens this fall. *K*
