Mr. Smith, and the opportunities they both provided me, I have been blessed to have performed classical and jazz music for people in many venues and in many locations around the country and Canada. I became a teacher, starting out for 1 semester in Almont and then due to a great opportunity to be closer to home, I took a position in the Lincoln Park Public Schools. I just finished my 21st year in Lincoln Park. I have been a band director growing the program from 50 students to 150 in 7 years, an elementary principal, high school principal, director of human

resources, and for the past 6 years, the superintendent of schools.

carried over into his adult years. Bill lives in Alabama and has coached youth baseball for years.



## Lanny Mills, JKF

Lanny Mills was an outstanding Gymnast at both JFK and Eastern Michigan University (EMU). We asked Lanny how he met the challenge of losing a leg. This is his response: After competing on EMU's Men's Gymnastics Team, I was fortunate to obtain my dream teaching and coaching position in Trenton Michigan. My teaching position was in Middle School Industrial Arts with Wood Shop, Metal Shop and Drafting classes. My coaching position was the Boys' Gymnastics Team at Trenton High School. Near the very end of my first year I was in a severe automobile accident that resulted in numerous fractures, internal injuries and the amputation of my right leg five inches below the knee.

Due to my family upbringing and the fine examples of teachers and coaches at Kennedy; like Roger Bechtol and Al Checkler,

I was imprinted with the belief that in life attitude is everything. Even before the surgery I had decided that this event would be no more than a minor

inconvenience and that I was probably the luckiest man to even be alive after the car I was riding in hit an overpass abutment.

During hospital post-op recovery, I was interviewed by the head nurse. She explained that many of her staff were very concerned about my mental state. Quite confused, I asked her specifically what was their continue on page 6 concern. She explained to me that they feared that I did not realize the severity of my condition. I found this more than a little bit amusing. After a long conversation I was able to convince her that I was not delusional and had a perfectly realistic view of my situation.

I believe that life has been uncharacteristically kind to me beyond what I deserve. Because of that, and the fact that every day I have lived beyond June 10th of 1972 is a bonus day, I truly try to do whatever great or small thing I can to make the world brighter for every person I come in contact with.

# > Judy Sumner Nieman, TCH Class of 60'

In the fall of 2013, Judy, was diagnosed with stage 4 ovarian cancer. She has graciously shared her journey with us.

Even though Judy's dad was an accomplished guitar player and vocalist he did not steer her into music lessons. But at an early age she saw and heard someone playing the accordion. That experience encouraged her to learn to play the accordion and piano. She became talented to the point of becoming an instructor of both instruments. In 1963, Judy married her high school classmate Murlyn Nieman. They now have 2 daughters and 4 wonderful grandchildren.
