TAYLOR PUBLIC SCHOOL GRADUATE HIGHLIGHT



We recently found an article written in 1979 regarding Mitch Utterback's (JFK 79) experience with "Outward Bound". The program took place in the Cascade Mountains in Oregon. Challenges included rock climbing, rappelling, snow climbing, and a 3-day solo in the wilderness. We were interested to know what Mitch did after that experience. He was contacted by Ken Renner of your Alumni Association Board and here is his Mitch's response:

Reflecting back on the teachers who left a positive impression on me and were good influences, a few of them come to mind. You may recall these names, too.

At West Jr High, Coach Henry pushed me to be a better competitor in gymnastics. Mr. Dimitriou taught me about places in the world I later visited thanks to his inspiration. Mr. December showed me how fun history and exploration could be, and directly contributed to my path later in life.

At JFK High Frau Denchfield patiently taught me German for three years, and unbeknownst to her- or me, at the time - helped prepare me for military service in West Berlin. Mr. Furbush taught me the power of words, both spoken and in literature. Mr. Williams patiently mentored the Youth in Government program kids and helped us better understand how our government is supposed to work. Mr. Bennett awarded me a varsity letter in Track and Field - something I neither expected nor was striving for, and his gesture taught me about recognizing and rewarding people who contribute more to a team than shine themselves. Many of you reading this contributed to who I am today and I thank you for that. We are products of how and where we were raised. My classmates in Taylor Schools have left me a better person than I would have been, had I not met you.

Post high school, I attended Michigan Tech for three years and dropped out to join the Army, making it through Special Forces training a year after I went in. I continued my service on and off for 33 years, finally retiring with 20 years of active duty and a full retirement in 2015. Thanks to the Army, I completed a bachelor's degree in criminal justice, a master's in homeland security and another master's in journalism. I was always interested in becoming a musician and practiced singing and playing guitar. After graduation I made an appointment to see Barry Gordy and walked into Hitsville USA and could not believe that also waiting for Gordy was Marvin Gaye. I played a couple of songs for Mr. Gordy and he said, "You are good -man; we can make a "soul" Bobby Darin out of you."With that encouragement, I moved to California and recorded my first song, "Cross the Western Plains". By 1969, Epic Columbia had me record my first album entitled "At Home" and distributed it in Europe and the USA.



Along with my passion for music, I was interested in coins, antiques, and artifacts. I started collecting, buying, and trading. A friend of mine found a photo of Einstein taken by E Willard Spur, autographed by Einstein, himself. A big buy and bigger sale. I realized there could be a good living in this business. I bought a VW bus that I filled every day and sold my finds to antique dealers. I never lost interest in my music and continued to play and sing at home. After a long hiatus from studio recording, I started again in 2017 and released two albums. "Vocal Passage" was released in 2020.

TAYLOR PUBLIC SCHOOLS HAVE GREAT TEACHERS

I spent more than half of my life in Taylor Schools, and I retired 14 years ago. Teaching in Taylor was often full of surprises. I was hired as a Social Studies teacher, but, thanks to John Pantalone, my career took a significant and fortuitous lane change. J.P. had tried for years to get me to take over the Spanish department – to no avail. Then, in 1980 I was granted a sabbatical! Can you even imagine that? A Taylor teacher on sabbatical!

I traveled to Israel with my wife and two little kids with the promise I would return after the year and lecture to students, church groups and others about the educational system on an Israeli kibbutz. A kibbutz is a communal village where there is very little private ownership and a unique educational system.

While overseas, I received a snail airmail, which at that time still took over a week to arrive. In that letter was my schedule for the coming year. In addition to my usual assignments of American government, world history and economics, I discovered I would teach Spanish I, II, III and IV!! It had been 12 years since I sat in a Spanish classroom, but it was the best career change ever! Over the next 2 dozen years I had the blessing of working with the same students for as many as 4 years, preparing them for life in the Spanishspeaking world. Students learned Spanish for medical work, social work, police work, and travel. There were even students who prepared for, took, and passed the Spanish AP exam. And, at one time, I counted 12 Spanish teachers who came out of room 202!

In addition to teaching in Taylor for 37 years, I was able to teach at the University of Michigan for 6 years, managed a youth's summer camp for 35 years, and was an instructor and assistant to the Rabbi at Beth Israel for 27 years. I am now fully retired and am enjoying time with my family and my hobby working with glass and producing many items.

I have fond memories of all of the positions I have held but none compare with the memories of my time teaching at John F Kennedy High School. I I have more than 3 dozen JFK yearbooks, and my closet is still filled with sweats, sweaters, shirts and even a jacket from JFK. I had the honor of representing Kennedy in the TFT for more than 3 decades and even served a term as the high school Vice President. My memories of teaching in Taylor are overwhelmingly positive and I treasure my ongoing relationships with Taylor teachers.

Some "Hometown" Information

The founding of our hometown, Taylor, is being celebrated this year. On March 16, 1847, 135 years ago, Taylor was approved by the Michigan Legislature to become Taylor Township.

Augustus Coan, who settled here in 1820, was the first property owner. Augustus had four sons: Peter, Marlin, Edmund, and Elisha. In 1835, Augustus purchased 100 acres of land from the Federal Government. This area of land had been part of Ecorse Township. Peter and Edmund worked to clear the land to build log homes for their families. Eventually the Coans owned more than 630 acres of land in the new Taylor Township. ...continued on page 5

As the farmers in our area became more established, they were tired of having to travel 10 miles to the Village of Ecorse to vote and conduct other business. They petitioned the Michigan Legislature and on March 16, 1847, their petition to organize as Taylor Township was approved.

They chose that name as a tribute to the Mexican War hero Zachary Taylor, who would become the 12th President of the United States.
